The primary way that Congress has performed this function with regard to science is through the enactment of the Patent Act and the creation of the Patent and Trademark Office (PTO) to administer application of the act. Coinciding with this expansion is an expansion of the role of the Federal Government in producing and regulating these areas of research and technology.
